Report: Hawaiian Steel Guitar Week in Waikiki

Aloha!

I decided that I should attend this years' Waikiki Steel Guitar Week on the island of Oahu, held during the week of July 8 to 13, 2024. The Waikiki Steel Guitar Week is produced by the non-profit Hawaiian Institute for Music Enrichment and Learning Experiences, or HIMELE. This festival is actually part of a series of year-round Hawaiian steel guitar festivals sponsored by HIMELE and held on various islands throughout the State of Hawaii. The Royal Hawaiian Center-Royal Grove Stage in the heart of Waikiki hosts this event and it is open to the public.

I could not be there for the entire week, but I was there for Friday and Saturday performances. I arrived around 6:00 P.M. on Thursday to warm balmy weather. There was a light sprinkle upon my arrival, but I don't recall any other rain on that weekend. The daytime temperature during my visit was 87 degrees with moderate humidity

Alan Akaka invited me to be a performer on Saturday morning. I got to perform right after super-pro Steve Cheney...lucky me! Not that I am that great a player, but I saw this as an opportunity to promote the upcoming Hawaiian Steel Guitar Association Festival in Emeryville, California, scheduled for September 26, 27 and 28. I note that one of our other Board members, Shinichi Kakiuchi and his wife Kumiko, also performed on Friday (very good performance!).

I hadn't been to Hawaii since 2019. At that time, we were visiting a 23 year-old Grandson who was working on a habitat restoration project for the U.S. Army and the University of Hawaii. He was living and working on the Eastern side of Oahu, which is a very different environment than Honolulu and Waikiki. (Think Bobby Ingano's chicken sounds on his steel guitar.)

There were two reasons for me attending this gathering. First, several of our HSGA members from Japan were participating in the event, and I saw this as an opportunity to visit with them and listen to their performances. The Japanese Hawaiian steel guitar players have worked with HIMELE to designate one day of Waikiki Steel Guitar Week for Japanese members to perform. Secondly, the trip was a scouting mission of sorts to check out possible hotel venues for a future HSGA member festival in Waikiki. I took lots of video on Friday and Saturday and we have included selections in our HSGA Virtual Festival 7, aired on Saturday, August 17 (please see the HSGA.org website). In addition, HIMELE professionally recorded the entirety of the performances of July 12 and 13 (three cameras and high-quality audio).

Member Interest Survey: 2025 HSGA Festival in Waikiki?

Years ago, when HSGA held a bi-annual (every odd year) Convention in Waikiki, the event attracted members from Japan, China, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, mainland United States, and other countries. The Waikiki Convention provided a venue where HSGA members could visit and play in the authentic Hawaiian environment (albeit the concrete jungle of Waikiki). In addition, the location enabled many local professional Hawaiian steel guitarists to participate in the event, enriching the overall musical and cultural experience. The Waikiki gatherings concluded in 2013 primarily because of changes in the composition of the Board of Directors (fewer Directors from Hawaii who were able to help organize the event). My recollection is that all of the Waikiki gatherings were held at the Queen Kapiolani Hotel on the southern fringe of Waikiki.

For the past year, the HSGA Board has had discussions about the possibility of holding another festival somewhere in Hawaii, and perhaps returning to the bi-annual schedule (every other year in Hawaii). We have considered several ideas and locations (the Big Island of Hawaii, Maui, Kauai, Oahu.) but always in conjunction with some other Hawaiian steel guitar event that would be of interest to our membership. Given that The Hawaiian Institute for Music Enrichment and Learning Experiences (HIMELE) has now established a series of steel guitar festivals throughout the year at different island locations throughout Hawaii, we thought that it would be beneficial to schedule an HSGA gathering in conjunction with one of those festivals.

The Waikiki Steel Guitar Week during the second week of July seems attractive, as many of our Japanese members are already attending on a regular basis. In addition, many of the professional Hawaiian steel guitar musicians are routinely scheduled to perform during the week.

We do have a Hawaii festival planning advantage at this time, in that Board member Eric Rindal has a personal friend who is an executive for the Outrigger Hotel and Resort chain. A few months ago, a subcommittee of the Board met with Eric's friend and discussed the idea of an HSGA festival in Hawaii at one of the Outrigger Resorts. Outrigger owns and operates many hotels in Hawaii, but a handful are truly resorts with meeting facilities and other amenities. (on the Islands of Hawaii, Maui, Oahu, and Kauai).

In Waikiki, one of their premium resorts is the Outrigger Reef Waikiki Beach Resort. For those of you familiar with Waikiki, this Outrigger property is next door to the Halekulani Hotel. <https://www.outrigger.com/hawaii/oahu/outrigger-reef-waikiki-beach-resort> I was told that the hotel has been renovated and updated within the last two years. I was able to stay at this property and was very satisfied with the room, amenities, and the services. The room was comfortable, staff members were friendly, helpful and courteous, and the on-site restaurants were very good. I took note of the meeting rooms located off of the central courtyard, with outdoor shaded seating areas just outside the rooms.



The Resort is a five minute walk from the Royal Hawaiian Center stage, where the Waikiki Steel Guitar Week concerts are held. Given all of these features, the Outrigger Reef Waikiki Beach Resort is in my mind a great location for an HSGA Festival.

Like all major beach front hotels and resorts in Waikiki, the Outrigger Reef Waikiki Beach Resort is pricey. However, comparing the room rates to other resorts along the beach, I found that the Outrigger Reef to be competitive. (You can check the various travel websites for their published room rates.) Our ability to secure a good meeting room rate for our festival is largely dependent on the member hotel days at the resort. Therefore, we are surveying the membership now to get an estimate of the number of members who think they might attend such a festival and stay at this resort.



We are still considering other hotel options to host the festival, including a return to the Queen Kapiolani Hotel, which is located on the southern edge of the Waikiki Beach hotel strip. This three-star facility has also been renovated within the last few years. The room rates are lower than beach front hotels, but the hotel is smaller and does not have all of the amenities of the larger hotels and resorts. The Queen Kapiolani Hotel is across the street from Kapiolani Park, and rooms facing South have a view of the park and Diamond Head. This hotel is about a twenty minute walk from the Royal Hawaiian Center stage.

Another option being considered is the Sheraton Princess Kaiulani Hotel. This hotel has also been recently remodeled. Room prices are more moderate for this three-star hotel. The meeting room is quite nice. <https://www.marriott.com/en-us/hotels/hnlks-sheraton-princess-kaiulani/photos>

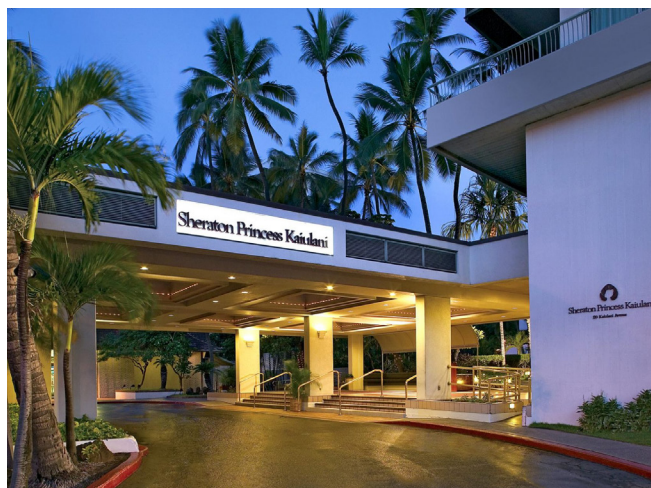
Directly across the street from the Sheraton Princess Kaiulani and on the beach is the four-star Moana Surfrider Hotel, the former home of the Hawaii Calls radio program in the 1930's and 1950's. Room price are in the \$350 to





to \$500 range and meeting rooms are available. <https://www.marriott.com/en-us/hotels/hnlwi-moana-surfrider-a-westin-resort-and-spa-waikiki-beach/overview/>

Of course, members may choose to attend the festival but stay at any other hotel in the area. Hotel room rates vary greatly, and there are condo and apartment rentals available. Generally, as you move inland and away from the beach, prices tend to be lower, depending on the rating of the facility and the amenities included.



To continue with negotiations and planning, we want to get sense of:

1. How many members and non-members would likely attend a HSGA Waikiki festival on July 8 and 9, 2025 (Tuesday & Wednesday)?
2. Do you have a preference for a host hotel for the festival?
3. Given that the festival would be held during Waikiki Steel Guitar Week, how many nights would you likely stay at the host hotel?

In addition, we invite members to submit suggestions for other possible host hotels. We will make every effort to explore locations, amenities and costs.

HSGA Needs YOU!

The Hawaiian Steel Guitar Association (HSGA) was registered as a nonprofit corporation in the State of Hawaii on January 6, 1992. In addition, HSGA successfully applied to the Internal Revenue Service to establish itself as a tax-exempt 501(3)(c) nonprofit corporation.

Under Federal and State laws, nonprofit corporations are required to adopt and adhere to governing Bylaws, and to maintain a Board of Directors. Directors are elected by the membership, and must be members in good standing. We are very proud of the fact that HSGA has sustained its efforts to promote Hawaiian music and the signature sound of the Hawaiian steel guitar for over 32 years. This has been possible because of the willingness of members like you to “step up” and volunteer to serve as a Board member or a volunteer.

There are currently eight members serving on the HSGA Board of Directors. Five of these members will reach their service term limit (six years) by June of 2026. In order to assure continuity of our organization, we urge you to consider serving as a Director in the near future. While the next election is not scheduled until 2026, we would like to begin the recruitment process now and ask that you submit an email or letter of interest within the next few months.

Those members who state their interest now may be called upon to serve sooner than 2026, as Director vacancies may occur at any time.

We understand that some members may be reluctant to volunteer to serve on a Board of Directors. Be assured that we all had some reluctance when we started. The most important factor is your willingness to ask questions, be a part of the discussion, and to bring your ideas to the table. Please feel free to contact any current Director to

discuss their experience on the Board. Typically, the Board of Directors meets once every three months (quarterly). Input, discussion, and occasional voting also periodically take place via group email. You may also be asked to serve on a committee which usually requires one or two extra meetings per quarter. These committees include work on the scholarship program, website, festival planning, and promotion, etc. Board members also occasionally contribute newsletter content in regards to their various activities on committees.

The overall duties of the Board as summarized as follows:

1. Ensure that the activities of the Organization are consistent with its Bylaws, Mission and Purpose
2. Provide Proper Financial Oversight; approve expenditures and monitor revenues.
3. Ensure Adequate Resources to fulfill its mission and goals; set dues and fees; pursue donations.
4. Ensure Legal and Ethical Integrity and Maintain Accountability
5. Ensure Effective Organizational Planning, Direction and Implementation
6. Enhance the Organization's Public Standing

The Board of Directors elects a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer every two years. These Officers are largely responsible for guiding their fellow Directors to fulfill their overall duties.

If you would like to perform at the festival, please complete the Performer portion of the registration form, Both forms can also be completed online at the hsga.org website. For those who wish to perform, keep in mind that you do not have to play an entire 25 minute set. Just let us know on the registration form how much play time you would like. If possible, we do request that you include one song by Barney Isaacs in your set.

HOTEL RESERVATIONS

The hotel of choice for this event is the Hilton Garden Inn-Emeryville. The hotel has set aside a block of suites for our Festival guests at the rate of \$179 per night. (daily breakfast buffet for two included). Please reserve by no later than September 7, 2024.

The newest HSGA scholarship student is 11-year-old Hi'ipoi Lindsey. She comes from a family with deep Hawaiian musical roots.

On Hi'ipoi's mother's side, her great-great-grandmother is Genoa Keawe. Her grandfather plays guitar, and was raised in Genoa Keawe's home in Papakolea on Oahu.

Hi'ipoi's cousins are Malie Lyman and Enosa Lyman, who also play steel guitar. On her father's side, her father, grandfather and great-grandfather play ukulele and guitar. Hi'ipoi's grandfather grew up in a Honolulu restaurant owned by his mother's father, where there was live Hawaiian music a few times a month. The restaurant was located at the corner of Cooke and King and was named "Esther's", after his mother.

Hi'ipoi is a good player already and you can see her perform live as part of Alan Akaka's NextGen performers.

"I enjoy playing the steel guitar because it doesn't hurt my fingers. Ever since I started playing steel guitar I appreciate Hawaiian music more. Knowing how to play makes me listen to Hawaiian music more closely. The first time that I heard that I was going to try playing the steel guitar, I found it a little hard and frustrating, but as I kept practicing, I liked it more."

"I am happy that people support me as I keep learning and improving in playing the steel guitar. I have a stronger understanding of Hawaiian culture and this helped me know more about my family too. I'm happy to be playing steel guitar."

Lunch with Bobby Five

Our lunch in April was special in that we celebrated Bobby's 90th Birthday, sort of. At the beginning of the month, I knew his birthday was coming up, but when we finally got together for lunch, I forgot to get him a birthday card. Least I could do was to buy lunch that day. Anyway, Happy Birthday my friend.

I suggested that we visit my favorite Mexican restaurant in Manteca, "La Playa." The food is great, but the decor of the restaurant is the real attraction. The walls and ceilings are hand painted with murals of ocean views and a painted thatched roof, making customers feel like they are sitting in an open-air restaurant on the west coast of Mexico.

Our conversations cover a broad range of topics, but usually include the unique nature of the steel guitar. Bobby frequently mentions how he has encountered many

people during his playing career that love the sound of the instrument, but don't really know what it is. One such encounter was with a guy who was sitting close to the bandstand and watching intently as Bobby played. At the end of the set, the guy came up to Bobby and said "I think that I figured it out! That's a pump organ that you are playing, right?"



In previous articles, I mentioned the fact that Hawaiian music was a great musical influence on Bobby in his early childhood years. He and his family listened to weekly broadcasts of the Hawaii Calls radio show, and the sound of the steel guitar inspired Bobby to learn how to play the instrument. Early in his learning, Bobby wrote to Jerry Byrd and asked him how to tune the steel guitar, and Jerry graciously responded and provided Bobby with the C6 tuning. The correspondence between the two extended over several decades and a friendship developed.



Another major Hawaiian music influence for Bobby came later in life from a gentleman by the name of Fredric Saichi Kawahara. Saichi was born on April 6, 1937 in Honolulu, Hawaii. He grew up in Paoua, where Hawaiian music and culture became a core part of his very being. Saichi's family relocated to San Francisco when he was a teenager, where he attended McKinley High School. During his high school years, he was part of the concert and marching bands, took part in student government and student service clubs.

As an adult, Saichi developed into a musician, bandleader, community activist, educator, promoter, and advocate for Hawaiian culture and music. In 1984, he organized the Kapalakiko Hawaiian Band based in San Francisco. He played the ukulele, harmonica, autoharp, taiko drums, and was the falsetto lead vocalist of the band.

Sometime in the early 1990's, Saichi asked Bobby Black if he would be interested in accompanying his band for select performances. Bobby gladly accepted the invitation, drawn by the opportunity to play the music that attracted him to the steel guitar at the beginning of his musical journey.

Bobby speaks fondly of his times with Saichi. While Saichi was known for being a "passionate" bandleader who demanded excellence from musicians and performers, he

always treated Bobby with great respect. Bobby suspects that his being older than Saichi may have had something to do with this. My guess is that Saichi appreciated amazing musicianship.



Bobby recalls that Saichi arranged a two-week performance tour in Hawaii for his Kapalakiko Hawaiian Band. The tour covered several islands, and everywhere that they performed, locals seemed to know Saichi. The tour included a performance at the Polynesian Cultural Center on Oahu. When the group performed in Waikiki, Bobby contacted Jerry Byrd, who now lived there, and the two were able to hang out together for a few hours. The visit with Jerry was "the icing on the cake" for Bobby.

On March 27, 2010, Saichi was presented The Hawaiian Music Award for Lifetime Achievement by the Hawaiian Music Award Association. In 2018, he was inducted into the Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame. Saichi passed away in 2019. Bobby appreciates the time that they got to work together, as well as the friendship that developed between the two of them.

Anyway, after lunch, we took a brief drive to visit a local almond farmer who has a collection of animals that are quite amazing to see including: three emus, two llamas, a bunch of geese, ducks, a turkey and a rooster. 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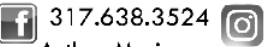
