STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Hawaiian Steel Guitar Association is a tax-exempt, nonprofit educational corporation in the State of Hawai'i under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Our primary purpose is to develop a global network of players and lovers of traditional Hawaiian music and to encourage the study, teaching, and performance of the Hawaiian steel guitar. Our primary financial goal is to provide scholarship assistance through donations to steel guitar students who demonstrate the ability and intent to become accomplished performers.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all steel guitar players and non-players around the world who support the perpetuation of the Hawaiian steel guitar. Annual dues are US\$30. The membership year begins July 1. Members receive the HSGA Quarterly and other group benefits. The Quarterly is mailed four times a year First Class to addresses in the United States and by Air Mail to foreign addresses. Members can obtain an Associate Membership for a spouse or family member at a cost of \$10, added to the annual dues; an Associate Member is entitled to discounts at certain HSGA functions and can vote in HSGA Board elections.

Geri Valdriz is a lap steel guitarist living in Waiehu, Maui. His passion is $k\bar{\imath}k\bar{a}$ kila, the Hawaiian style of playing the steel guitar. Through music and mele, Geri seeks to capture the essence and soul of the instrument.

Geri is a member of the Maui slack key guitar bands Ola Hou, Maui Jam, and the Kika Kila Band. He plays at slack key and steel guitar concerts, hula shows, lū'aus, and island-style gatherings on Maui. He also tours in the U.S. and Japan, bringing the sound of the steel guitar to shores far away.


Geri has recorded the following instrumental CDs: *Lap Steel Harmony*, *Breath of Steel*, *Kika Kila*, and *The Art of Steel*. He has also recorded for various artists on Maui.

Geri is a guest steel guitarist at George Kahumoku's Slack Key Guitar Show on Maui, and has taught the steel guitar workshop at Keola Beamer's Aloha Music Camp. He also played steel guitar on the recent Project Kuleana video titled *Nā Keiki O Ka Pūnana Leo O Maui*.

Geri is the musical host for a live weekly radio show called *Hawaiian Steel*. The program is dedicated to kīkā kila, its music, and its great players from the past to the present. It is broadcast every Tuesday from 5:00 PM to 8:00 PM on Mana'o Radio, KMNO, 91.7 FM from Wailuku, Maui. You can catch it on the air or streaming live at www.manaoradio.com.

Geri curated the History of the Hawaiian Steel Guitar exhibits at the Story of Hawai'i Museum in Lahaina and Kahului. He also presents the Vintage Steel Guitar Display at numerous steel guitar festivals across the Hawaiian Islands.

Geri is a student of steel guitar master Jerry Byrd and plays a pre-war Rick A-22 frypan model in the A6th tuning. His favorite steel guitar players include

Currently Geri plays the steel guitar every Thursday at the Maui Coffee Attic in Wailuku and every Sunday at the Kahului Airport. This from Geri: *Ka'ua e ho'o kani ka kīkā kila!* (Come and play steel guitar with me!)

About Member Renewals

HSGA is a nonprofit organization, which is guided by a board of directors in accordance with IRS rules. Each board member serves up to three consecutive terms of two years each. Up for reelection is our current board consisting of President Frank Della-Penna, Vice-President John Limbach, Secretary-Treasurer Tony Fourcroy, Margie Mays, Mike Wittmer, Jack Aldrich and recently-appointed board member Teri Gorman. We are looking to add two new board members, Bob Alaniz and Chris Ruppenthal, which will give us the maximum allowed nine-person board according to our bylaws. We are asking the membership to approve the proposed slate of these nine candidates.

To better acquaint our membership with the slate, we asked Bob Alaniz and Chris Ruppenthal to submit a photo and a brief summary of their history and qualifications (see page 4). Both are highly qualified and motivated, and have a strong passion for Hawaiian steel guitar and Hawaiian music and culture. We're also including new board member Teri Gorman's photo and bio.

Board members meet at least four times a year via teleconference, and face to face at our festivals if there are enough in attendance to hold a meeting. The board handles things like festival planning, membership initiatives, and the awarding of scholarships.

Please cast your vote to 'Approve' or 'Reject' the entire slate of candidates using the ballot form included with this newsletter. Normally, we have a more standard election where there are more nominees than positions to be filled and where the highest vote-getters are elected. We're doing it this way, in part, because we need two new board members and we have only two new candidates. Additionally, we're asking you to write your name on the ballot in the spaced provided if you would like to serve on a future board. You can also write the name of another member you would recommend. Voting instructions are detailed in the right column of the ballot. I focus primarily on pre-1935 acoustic steel guitar recordings and love to share them with HSGA members!

I have 15-plus years of professional performance experience with multiple CDs, a DVD, and thousands of gigs to my credit. I regularly perform an early Hawaiian repertoire on a circa 1930 Weissenborn Kona steel with my band Mal-O-Dua. Through my performance experience I have become connected to early Hawaiian style players throughout the world.

I have a B.A. in Entertainment and Media Business with a focus on entertainment marketing and social media. I am working on a number of early Hawaiian CD reissue projects through

Frank's Vision for HSGA Going Forward


Frank is passionately committed to expand the reach of HSGA, grow its membership, better serve its members, increase HSGA's funding base, expand its scholarship program, enhance its social media presence, and foster HSGA collaboration with other organizations devoted to Hawaiian music and culture around the world.

Frank's accomplishments as HSGA President include the following:

- Expansion of the HSGA Scholarship Program with the appointment of an engaged Scholarship Committee. Present students include Mālie Lyman, Hō'ailona Mahuka, Pono Fernandez, and Isabella Bertelmann.
- Initiation in 2019 of an enhanced fundraising program titled "Kids Learning the Hawaiian Steel Guitar" (KLHSG) to broaden the reach of our scholarship program and to feature these rising stars of the Hawaiian steel guitar.
- Invitation of the first group of hula dancers from China to perform at HSGA's 2018 Fort Collins Festival.
- Expansion of the board to include more specifically needed skills, especially regarding fundraising and increasing HSGA membership.
- Restoration of HSGA's nonprofit status, which had been suspended by the IRS, enabling HSGA to solicit tax deductible donations and apply for grants.

Frank is especially focused on fostering new Hawaiian steel guitar talent via the HSGA Scholarship Program. He brought former scholarship student Alexis Tolentino to perform at the 2018 Fort Collins Festival and is working to bring Mālie Lyman to perform at HSGA's 2020 Festival. He provided two of his own steel guitars to current scholarship students in Hawai'i.

Frank has contributed several *HSGA Quarterly* articles on Hawaiian musicology, culture and other topics and has posted articles and news alerts of interest to the Hawaiian community on HSGA's Facebook page in order to enhance our reach and draw in new members. He participated as a member of the Hawaii State Society planning group for the Obama Hawaiian Inaugural Ball in Washington, D.C.

Frank's Steel Guitar Journey

Frank started on Hawaiian steel guitar at the Harlin Brothers Studio in Indianapolis when he was a young boy. In New York City, Frank studied Hawaiian guitar with vaudeville artist Roy Smeck, and nose flute and other Hawaiian rhythm implements under the tutelage of Calvin Ho. On Okinawa, he studied sanshin under Teruya Kinyehi.

In the mid-'90s, Frank hosted and produced a public radio show devoted to Hawaiian music and culture. He has a vast library of recordings, ranging from early Edison wax cylinders to 78 rpm and LP records to CDs. Frank initiated a visit to the University of Hawai'i with Kamaka Tom on behalf of Dirk Vogel to monitor progress on digitizing Dirk's storied Hawaiian music record collection.

Frank has served on the Board of Governors for the Hawai'i State Society and performed for several years with the Aloha Boys and the Halau 'O Aulani and has performed in the U.S. Capitol Statuary Hall for the Kamehameha Lei Draping ceremonies. As an accomplished steel guitarist, Frank frequently performs to great acclaim. Frank's favorite steel guitarists include Barney Isaacs, Sol Hoʻopiʻi, Jules Ah See, David Keliʻi, Tommy Castro, Sol Bright and Gabby Pahinui. He served six years in the Marine Corps and retired after thirty-eight years of service in state and federal law enforcement agencies.


Frank resides in Washington, D.C. with his wife, Stephanie Ortoleva, an international human rights attorney and founder of Women Enabled International.

The 2020 Hawaiian Steel Guitar Festival at Ka Makana Ali'i will be presented on March 21, 2020 from 11 AM to 3 PM. The program will be held at the center's stage and will feature performances by seven NextGen keiki steel guitar players and musicians, and pro steel guitarists Alan Akaka, Jeff Au Hoy, Bobby Ingano, Kapono Lopes, and Greg Sardinha. NextGen steel guitarists and musicians from Ke Kula Mele Hawai'i School of Hawaiian Music include Enosa Lyman, Ikaika Orlando, Tai Misailidis, Hō'ailona Mahuka, Joey Misailidis, Pono Fernandez, and Mālie Lyman.

The festival will be presented free to the public by Ka Makana Ali'i and the Hawai'i Institute for Music Enrichment and Learning Experiences (HIMELE) in association with the Ke Kula Mele Hawai'i School of Hawaiian Music. 

Steel Guitars at Kālahuipua'a

Steel guitar entertainment was featured at the Mauna Lani Auberge Resorts Collection hotel's February Twilight at Kālahuipua'a program on the Island of Hawai'i. The Twilight event is presented each month on a Saturday close to that month's full moon. The program is held at the Eva Parker Woods Cottage museum, a quaint cottage perched above ancient Hawaiian fish ponds on the grounds of the Mauna Lani Resort.

The Twilight program was incorporated into the Special Edition Hawai'i Island Steel Guitar Festival. Originally scheduled for December 2019, the festival was canceled, then reinstated and rescheduled for the February 7-9 weekend to help the hotel celebrate its grand re-opening and completion of its \$100,000,000+ renovation project that began in October 2018.

The hotel describes the program on their website. "Each month during the full moon, music lovers bring blankets and folding chairs to the oceanfront lawn at the Eva Parker Woods Cottage. 'Ukulele and guitar players gather on the lanai (porch) to talk story and play their favorite tunes. The stage is humble but the talent is world-class. For over two decades, the Twilight at Kālahuipua'a concert series has served as a Who's Who of Hawaiian music." The program features "talk story" and entertainment by some of Hawai'i's greatest entertainers and is hosted by the hotel's Kahu Hanai, Danny K. Akaka, Jr.

The February program featured NextGen steel guitarists and musicians Pono Fernandez, Mālie Lyman, Ethan Goore, and Joey and Tai Misailidis performing on the cottage lanai and led by Kumu Alan Akaka. After a short break, the entertainment continued with a round-robin steel guitar jam session on the lanai with featured steel guitarists Alan Akaka,

Another Photo Mystery!

I wonder if HSGA members would care to tackle another mystery photo?

I have had the undated snapshot (shown right) of a Lani McIntire orchestra for many years. Two steel guitarists can be seen standing in the front row.

It will be remembered that Lani recorded a 78 rpm album set, *Hawaiian Melodies*, with steel guitar duettists in 1945 for Sonora and Varsity. The sides included "Drowsy Waters," "Hilo March," "Kilima Waltz," "Moonlight in Hawaii," "Dreams of Old Hawaii," "Mai Poina 'Oe Ia'u," "Paradise Isle" and "Hawaiian Sunset."

Tracks also turn up on LPs and EPs on associated labels, such as Royale.

However, these are with a rhythm section plus piano and vibes, rather
