


Opening ceremonies began Thursday morning at 9 AM with the

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STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The Hawaiian Steel Guitar Association is a private foundation whose primary purpose is to develop a global network of players and lovers of traditional Hawaiian music and to encourage the study, teaching, performance, and manufacture of the Steel Guitar. Its primary financial goal is to provide scholarship assistance through donations and bequests to steel guitar students who demonstrate the ability and intent to become accomplished performers.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is open to all steel guitar players and non-players around the world who support the promotion and perpetuation of the Hawaiian steel guitar. Annual dues are US\$26. The membership year begins July 1. Members receive the HSGA Quarterly and other group benefits. The Quarterly is mailed four times a year by U.S. Bulk Permit to the USA and by "Printed Matter" Surface to foreign addresses. Add the following amount to the annual dues for faster delivery: \$2 for domestic First Class or \$6 for Air Mail outside of North America. Members can obtain an Associate Membership for a spouse or family member at a cost of \$10, added to the annual dues; the specified person is entitled to discounts at certain HSGA functions (convention registration fees, for example).



Steel Course Update

Lorene has already mailed 76 of her steel guitar courses to Hawai'i schools as a donation to the continuing education of Hawaiian youth. As we mentioned last issue, she is producing and distributing the course at her own expense. Here's Lorene:

The last two mailings of the course were on October 11 and October 26, long after September 11th and into the anthrax scare period. There must have been a memo to schools telling them not to open any mail from unsolicited sources. So far I've had two returned. I can't even send a letter ahead of time because that, too, will be suspicious. Next, I'm going to try contacting the schools by email before mailing out courses.

I did get two contributions that should be acknowledged. Louie Kitchen sent me \$135 which was for two mailings: one course to Kaubisch Memorial Library in Fostoria, Ohio and one course plus a copy of my book to the Music Archives of the Jerome Library at Bowling Green State University. Both items were sent in memory of Louie's dad, Ken Kitchen, who taught steel guitar for a lifetime in that area.

The second donation came from Al Engler of Antioch, Illinois who ordered a course from me, which is priced at \$70 plus \$10 postage, but he gave me a check for \$100. I'll use the extra \$20 to do another mailing. I found a school on the Big Island that listed its email (the Malamalama Waldorf school), and they've given me their permission to send. I'll keep you posted.

I wonder how many more courses will come sneaking home with tails between their legs?

DOC'S GIG BAG

Ho'olokahi

The staff of your central office sincerely hope that you all had a wonderful holiday season, and we wish you the very best that the year 2002 can offer. The events of September 11 cast a serious pall over the normally festive season and have ominous consequences for millions of people around the world. Here in Hawai'i the results of those events have had effects on the lives of many of our citizens, especially those involved with our largest industry – tourism.

Recent economic figures provided by the State of Hawai'i suggest a decline in tourism of at least 40 percent. Those of us who frequent Waikīkī on a regular basis can attest to the noticeable reduction in both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. For the professional musician in general and for gigging steel guitarists in particular, our slice of the economic pie took a hit. Many

public performing venues have eliminated or reduced the size of the musical group (trio to duo, duo to solo) and cut the performance pay for the group.

It should be mentioned that these cuts have been implemented pretty much across the board throughout the industry. Cab drivers, tour bus operators, hotel staff, cruise boats, restaurants, nightclubs, and many merchants and private service companies throughout the state have been impacted. Add this to the fact that Hawai'i had already been in a protracted economic recession for a few years leading up to September 11, and you get a sense that the period of economic recovery will probably be a long one.

If there is good news, it is this: people here in Hawai'i are genuinely committed to preserving the freedoms that we have enjoyed as citizens of a free nation. I get a sense that many of my musician colleagues are here for the long haul, ready to do their part, whatever it may be, to advance and promote the visitor industry of Hawai'i, and to join the world in rejecting the forces of terror and conflict. -- *Imua Hawai'i*, Doc

"Softer Side of Steel" by Sharon Denney




"Souvenirs" by Wiki Waki Woo


"Paradise Isle" by Felix Mendelssohn






From the Editors

I wish to relate to you with some measure of sadness that the venerable Hiram Olsen Trio is no longer engaged in performance at the Halekulani's 'House Without a Key'. In an industry where longevity at any given performance venue is usually measured in terms of days and weeks rather than years, Hiram Olsen has held court at that stage for nearly three decades. That fact alone should stand as testimony to his talent, stage presence, and professionalism. Everyone who knows Hiram, whether on a professional, casual, or personal level, speaks of his strong character and quiet, modest nature. In addition

to Hiram, the group includes his son Casey (steel guitar) and Dennis "Bla" Keohokalole (bass).

I have come to know Hiram through our common association with HSGA's annual Ho'olaule'a. Jerry Byrd produced the first Steel Guitar Ho'olaule'a back in 1982. Then, as now, he has always insisted that the program enlist the services of Hawaii's consummate music professional, Hiram Olsen. Hiram has been supporting the Hawaiian Steel Guitar Association since before there was an HSGA. With the long hours that the Ho'olaule'a has required of its backup musicians and the low level of compensation, he has essentially donated many, many long hours in service to our club. Always on time, never out of tune, and always ready to go with

the highest level of performance, Hiram has set the standard by which many musicians would do well to emulate.

It is not the position of this article to describe the circumstances of their departure from the Halekulani, nor to comment on the vagaries of the music industry in Hawai'i. Suffice to say that I am not alone in the opinion that the Hiram Olsen Trio remains as one of the top in-demand musical groups in the islands. It's already apparent that Hiram will have his choice of a number of venues. Wherever that may be, you can be sure that folks will be lined up to witness this marvelous musical group. We'll keep you posted.

Getting to Know You...

HSGA Member, Evelyn Brue Roeder

The golden age of the family-owned music store sadly appears to be behind us. You can still occasionally find that charming small-town shop where you can spend hours combing the displays, hallways, and teaching studios. What a story those walls could tell of an era where steel guitar had a commanding presence in the music world and in the community! We're sure the Evelyn Brue Guitar School was one such place. Take a bow, Evelyn!

In 1940, Evelyn Brue rented rooms above a shoe store in "uptown" Ottawa, Illinois. This was the beginning of the Evelyn Brue Guitar School, which would remain at that location for 43 years.

Evelyn was keenly interested in teaching music and studied with

the best teachers in Chicago and Cleveland, including Harry Stanley of the Oahu Publishing Company. Students of all ages and from all walks of life came to study steel guitar, standard guitar, and other fretted instruments.

Throughout the years, the Evelyn Brue School of Guitar had a weekly enrollment of more than 150 pupils, with attendance soaring to around 300 per week during peak years. Says Evelyn, "The years were filled with teaching steel in all its forms and tunings, using single and multipleneck steel guitars... In 1947, I started my students on Multikord steels, as the weight of many necks became a burden... We could easily get the other tunings."

Evelyn became a nationally known leader in her profession, bringing

her students to state, national, and international contests. Evelyn's Islanders Band, which featured her most advanced students, played regularly for 25 years and won hundreds of trophies at contests in Chicago, Cleveland, New York, and other major cities around the country.

In addition to teaching, Evelyn was also a conductor, composer, arranger, costume designer, and public speaker, to name a few! Eventually her husband, George Roeder, joined her in operating the school, and together they presented students in countless performances. Evelyn and George closed the uptown school in 1983, but remain active in music, teaching and selling instruments out of their home.

"My mind is filled with beautiful memories," says Evelyn. "I have a few steel students – two on pedal steel, two on Dobro, one learning E lowbass, and another studying the C6th tuning. There is more interest in steel guitar, so we'll be accepting more steel students. We recently celebrated our 60th anniversary."

Announcing Rooms for "May Week" 2002

Although HSGA conventions are held in Hawai'i on odd-numbered years, many members choose to gather around the first week of May on even-numbered years on an informal basis. For this reason, we have requested that the Queen Kapi'olani Hotel hold 15 rooms for our members from April 27 through May 11, 2002.

Members who are coming to Hawai'i during this time period and want to stay at the Queen Kapi'olani should make their reservations with the hotel's Central Reservations Office. *Do not call the hotel directly*. The toll free number is (800) 367-2317, and the local phone number

is (808) 922-4671. Their mailing address is Central Reservations, 175 Paoakalani Ave. Honolulu, HI 96815-3743. Guests must advise the reservations agent that they are reserving the Queen Kapi'olani Hotel through **Reservations Booking Number 10643** (this will get you the special rate!)

The rate per Superior room is \$64 per day. Roll away beds are available at additional charge. A mandatory porterage charge of \$4.68 (in/out) per person will be assessed. Hawai'i State Tax of 4.166% and hotel room tax of 7.25% will be added on the per night rate. Guests will be responsible for guaranteeing their own rooms and will be responsible for their own charges. If you have questions on any of the above, please ask Central Reservations.

COCO WIRE

A very special and emotional celebration of the 60th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor brought hundreds of veterans to the Islands – possibly their last trip. In the wake of the September 11 attacks, Pearl Harbor has a newfound meaning to a new generation. Proof of this symbolic connection was the presence of New York City firefighter victims' families, who were flown in and put up free of charge, courtesy of the State of Hawai'i.

Legendary composer and performer, **Aunty Irmgard Aluli**, died in Honolulu on October 4, three days short of her 90th birthday, while family and friends gathered around her at Kaiser Hospital and sang the songs she loved. She is missed by all.

Wiki Waki Woo is busy, busy in the wake of their new CD release "Souvenirs" (see review in this issue), including performances at Windward Mall, the Manoa Public Library, and a special "Lunch with Looney Tunes" performance in downtown Honolulu's Tamarind Park. Way to go!

When former *Quarterly* editor **Marjorie Scott** and cohorts raided the Waikīkī Beach Marriott to hear **Aunty Genoa Keawe** with **Alan Akaka** and the gang, they caught a slimmed-down **Bobby Ingano** sitting in and an entire hotel packed with conventions engaged in general merrymaking, "lei-ing," and kissing. Marjorie pleaded negligence in not recording this "kiss-fest" on camera. Maybe it's just

Some Comments by Jerry Byrd

I would assume that most of you, or at least those of who have visited Hawai'i a few times in the last ten years know what *Jawaiian* is... It is a word coined by a local DJ to describe Hawaiian music with a Jamaican beat (Reggae). It's a big thing now and has been for the past several years and, like rock 'n' roll, refuses to die.

You ain't heard nothin' yet till you hear songs like "Waipio" or "South Sea Island Magic", et al done Jamaican style. Or maybe "Jawaiian Paradise" or even the "Jawaiian Wedding Song"... or how about this for openers:

"I don't like shoes upon my feet, To play around is such a treat, We only like play da reggae beat, That's the Jawaiian in me."

The top performers in Jamaica are booked here regularly where they are idolized by the young locals. I'm quite sure that they make *much* more money here than they do in Jamaica... or they wouldn't come – right?

We are "losing" Hawai'i (if not already) and subtlely becoming *Caribbean* musically. If it was an even "tradeoff", fine – but I say to them: "Go to Jamaica and see how much Hawaiian music they are playing over there" – or better yet, "how many shows have you guys played in Jamaica????"

Visitors coming to Hawai'i for the first time must wonder if they boarded the wrong plane...

I continue to hope, however. Now and then one of the new young talents stays true to his heritage and does an entire CD of Hawaiian music! At least all of the songs are Hawaiian, though the instrumental accompaniment is varied. A few even use steel guitar – usually played poorly but at least enough to add a little color. And now and then, an "original" song is added to the mix. They mean well and are very careful to use proper Hawaiian language, but the music rarely fits the lyrics and does not have the "flow" that is found in the old songs.

I feel that Hawaii's greatest need today is composers and songwriters of the caliber of those "greats" of the '30s, '40s, and '50s such as *Alex Anderson*, *Charles E. King*, *Andy Iona*, *Danny Stewart*, *Mel Peterson*, *Danny Kua'ana*, *Harry Owens*, and on and on. Those are the ones who painted a musical picture of Hawai'i that lives still.

So, the only option to this need is to take the old songs and then, to stay "commercial," add the "new sound" – the "Jawaiian" and "away they go" – instant "stars!"

Speaking of Hawaii's great composers, I must make mention of our loss of Aunty Irmgard Aluli recently. Another of Hawaii's prolific writers, as well as a loving and lovely Hawaiian lady, she was the epitome of all things Hawaiian and was much loved by all who knew her. The funeral was huge and Hawaiian music was nonstop.

I was fortunate enough to have played on one of her albums along with her "Puamana" trio – two of her beautiful daughters, Mihana and Aima, and niece, Luana.

Aunty Irmgard was in the same category as all the other greats – *irreplaceable* – the creator made only one of each. Aloha Aunty. -- JB





